Statistics for Testing

All NR exams are "Adaptive Testing"

Below is the description of "Adaptive Testing"

The adaptive process is an exam sequence that means the more questions the testee gets correct in sequence and difficulty the less questions the testee will answer.

On the opposite side if the testee answers questions incorrectly, they may take more questions to pass

The minimum number of questions to take and pass is 70, the maximum is 120

The maximum number of questions to take and fail is 70, the maximum is 120

The fewer the questions you take represents a greater preparation and comprehension of material covered in the class to successfully pass the NR exam

Below are the statistics for the last 140 students from our program who have taken the NR exam

116 have passed the exam in 80 questions or less on the first attempt

22 have passed the exam in 80-120 questions on the first attempt

2 passed the exam on the second attempt at the exam

EMT Class Reviews from Previous Students

I was referred to PEE by a Captain at Grand Junction Fire Department during a job fair. The Captain had said that PEE and Fidel we highly respected and trusted to produce competent EMT's. So I contacted Fidel shortly after and signed up for my EMT Basic course in March of 2018.

While I'm sure the other centers that offer training For EMS are good in their own right, there is a noticeable difference in the amount of practical knowledge I've seen between what I know and seen in other former PEE students compared to students from the other centers.

I took Fidel's EMT-Basic class in 2017, and to be honest, it was one of the best decisions I have made. The class is challenging, and it will push you very hard - sometimes to your limit - but if you are motivated to work in this field, you will get through it. EMT
